<u>Pride</u>

"Do nothing from rivalry or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others." (Philippians 2:3–4)

"Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God," (Philippians 2:5–6)

"did not count equality with God as something to be used to his own advantage," (Philippians 2:6)

"but made himself of no reputation, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men." (Philippians 2:7; cf. John 1:10-11)

"And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." (Philippians 2:8; cf. Isaiah 52:14; 53:2–3)

"Therefore God has highly exalted him" (Philippians 2:9; cf. Isaiah 42, 49, 50,52, 53; Ephesians 1:20-21, 4:10; Acts 2:33, 3:13, 5:30-32; Hebrews 1:3, 7:26, 8:1-2)

"and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Philippians 2:9–11; cf. Isaiah 45:21-23)
